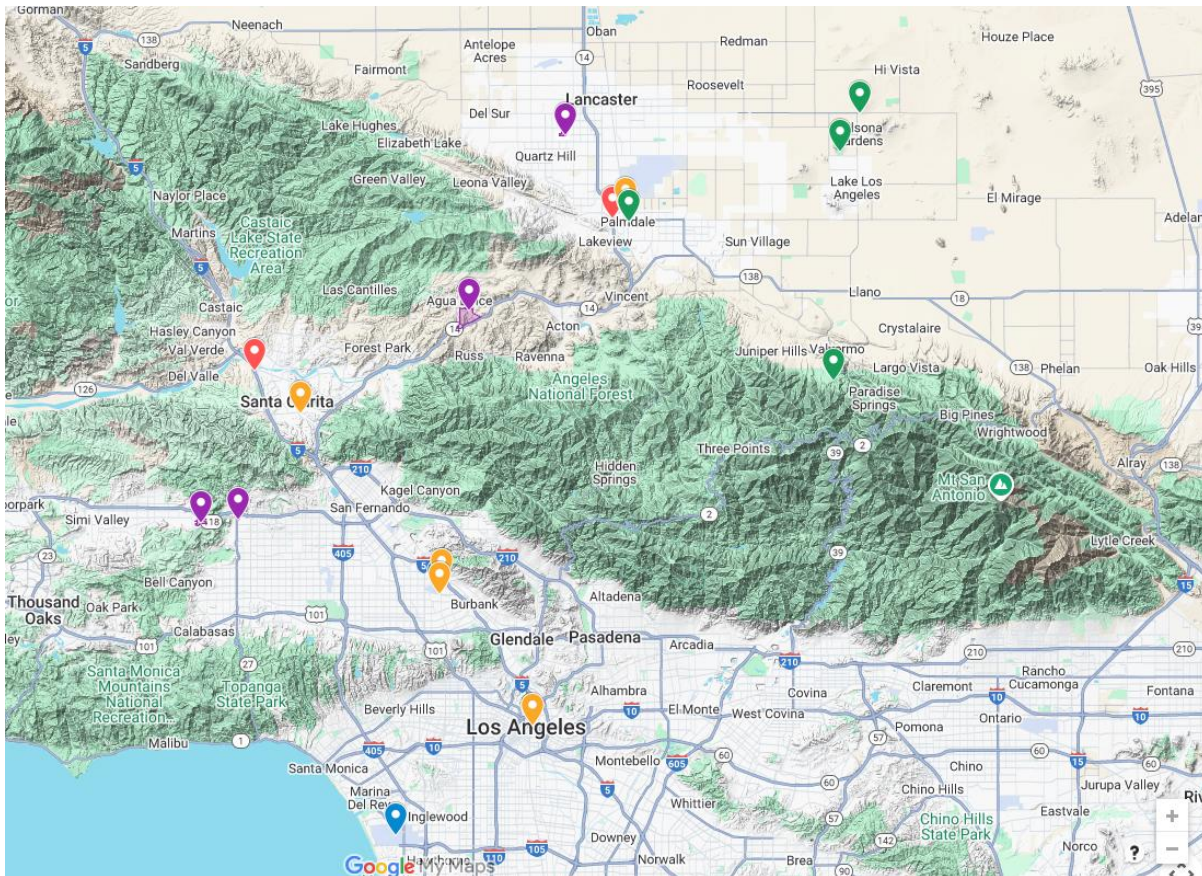
Overview of stage locations

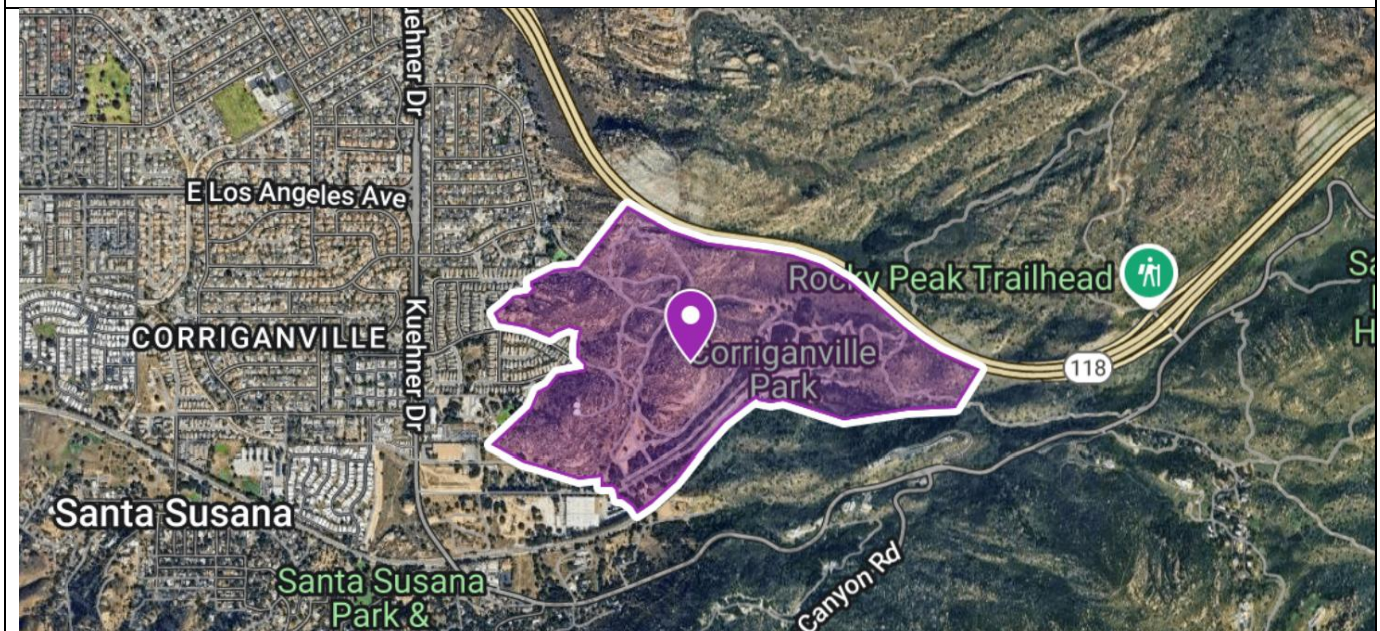

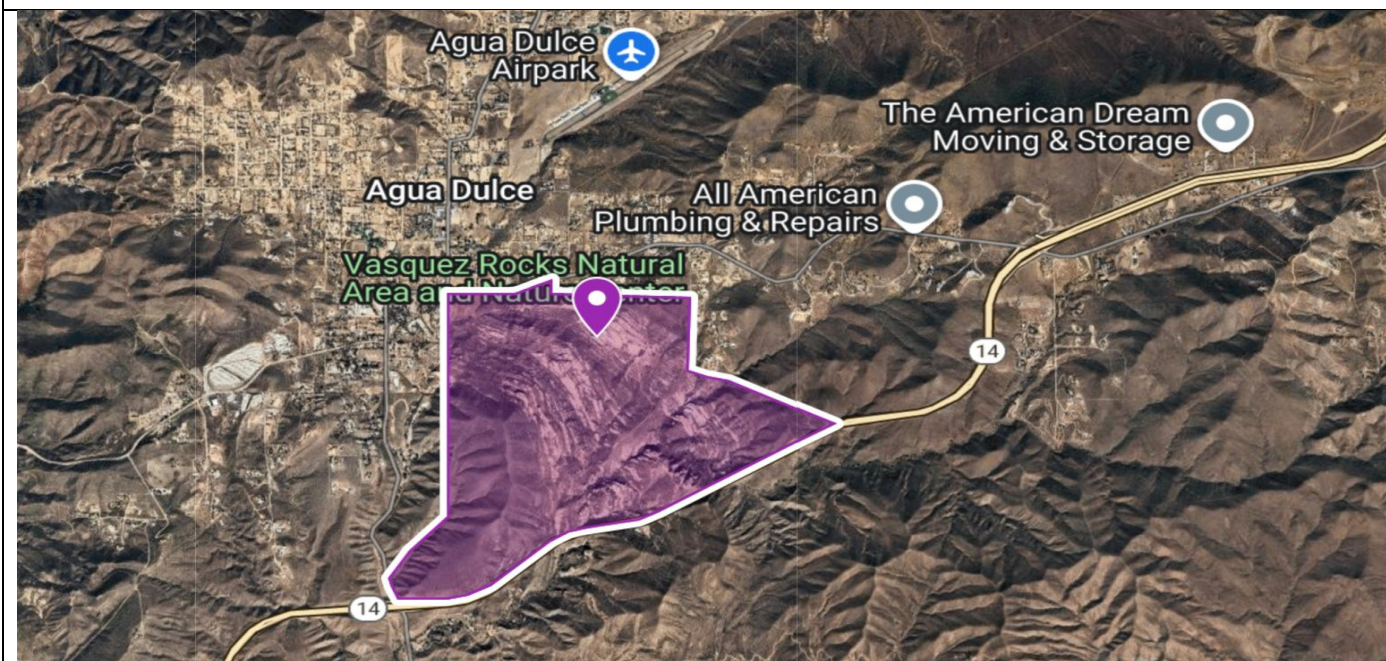

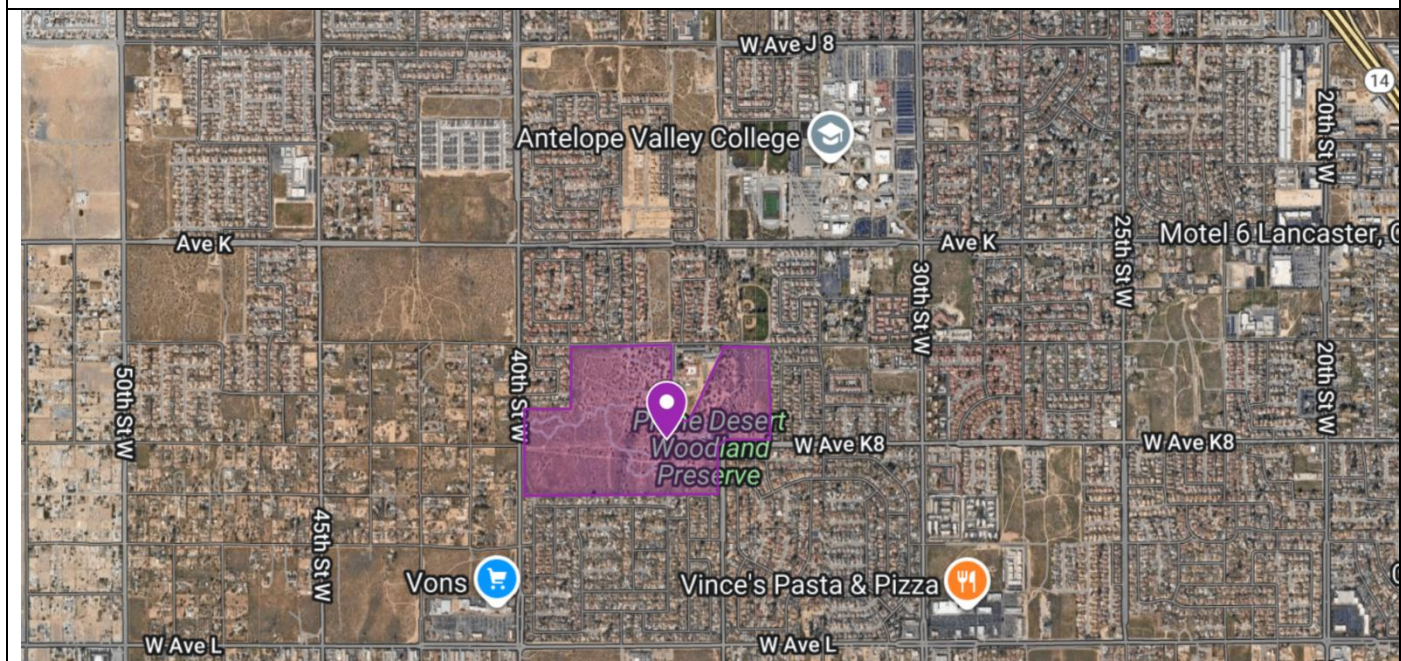

6. Event Center

The event center will be located near Palmdale, California. The exact event center will be announced in Bulletin 2.



7. Transportation and accommodation

Passports are needed to enter the United States. For visa information, please visit the federal travel website:

Transport to the Event Center is by car or bus from Los Angeles, California. We highly recommend renting a car. All airports have many rental car agencies, and Uber or Lyft (private taxi service) are also available. Amtrak can get you by rail to Los Angeles from US major cities.

The competition region is about 120 km, or 105 minutes by car, from Los Angeles International Airport (LAX), and about 3 hours by light rail and bus. Uber or Lyft private taxi fare from LAX is about \$150.00.

Your travel agent or airline should be consulted to customize your planning for your travel and vacation time in this popular area for tourists.

Accommodations are plentiful in the area nearby the event center. There are a wide range of different holiday options available, including camping, cabins, private homes, motels, hotels from 1- to 5-star, condominiums, flats, plus Airbnb, VRBO and other rental homes throughout the area.

8. Classes and Participation

Competition Classes and Participation may be found in the [IOF Rules for Trail Orienteering Events](#), sections 5 and 6. There is a pending change, which is described in the IOF document titled “Junior Competition in Trail orienteering”. An excerpt from this document is shown here:

Proposed implementation

1.1. Competition programme

The junior competition will be integrated in WTOC (and RTOCs) using the same or similar courses as used for the Open and/or P class. There is no intention to make an easier or shorter junior course.

The competition programme remains unchanged.

1.2. Competition classes and entry limits

There will be three classes:

- Open (any competitor)
- P class (only competitors with valid P class eligibility certificate) and
- Junior (any competitor aged 20 years or younger at the end of the calendar year (U20)).

Therefore, a U20 competitor with P class certificate can enter any one of the three classes. All U20 Competitors can enter either O or Junior class. Every competitor is only considered for prizes in the class they entered in that event. It is permitted for a competitor to start in different classes for which they are eligible throughout the championship, e.g. Junior class in individual PreO and Open class in the relay or vice versa.

For WTOC, every federation will be allowed to enter 4 competitors each into Open class, P class and Junior class. This replaces the current two additional junior places. As previously, personal wildcards are allocated for each class to the current champion and the Top 15 competitors in the World Ranking lists (separated for each class and discipline) 3 months before the competition date if amongst the 2 best ranked in their federation. These athletes can be entered in addition to the normal allocation. Each federation can enter one relay team for each class.

1.3. Introduction of separate classes in TempO

There is currently only one class in the TempO competition. Because we observe declined participation of P class eligible competitors in TempO and consider that increased participation of juniors would further exacerbate this trend, we propose to introduce separate classes also in the TempO competition. The entry limits for each class (Open, Junior and P class) as detailed above in section 1.2 will apply to the TempO qualification event. The number of competitors who will qualify for the TempO finals in each class is one third of the participants on the start list for the qualification events rounded up to the nearest even number, but at least 10 and maximally 30. If competitors from the same class start in two or more qualification heats, an equal number of finalists qualify from each heat.

9. Awards

World Trail Orienteering Championships

P-class, Open class and Junior class are eligible for awards. Competitors are only considered for awards in the class they entered for the event.

- The top three qualifying athletes in each discipline (PreO and TempO) will receive IOF medals.
- The top six qualifying athletes in each discipline (PreO and TempO) will receive IOF diplomas.
- The top three qualifying National Teams in the Relay will receive IOF medals, one per team member.
- The top six qualifying National Teams in the Relay will receive IOF diplomas.

World Ranking Event

- PreO and TempO participants will automatically receive World Ranking points.

10. Description of Punching system and Results display

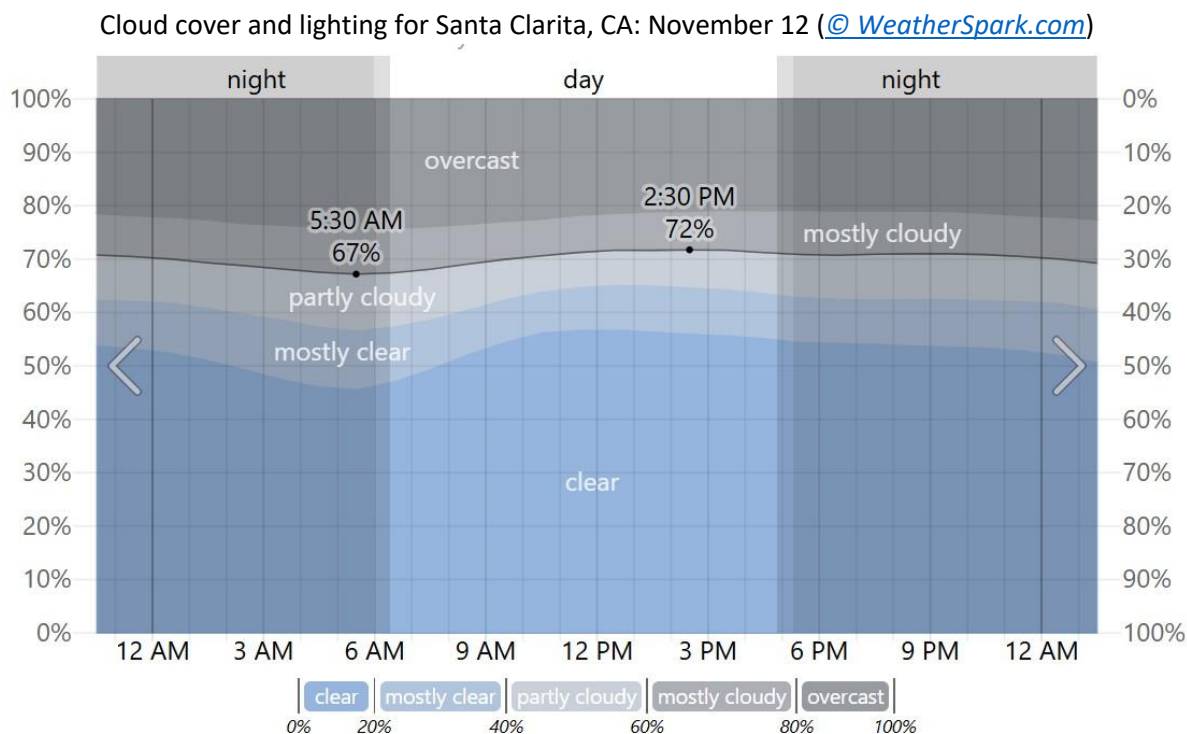
The ToePunch electronic punching system will be used.

Results will be displayed at each event.



11. Weather and climate conditions

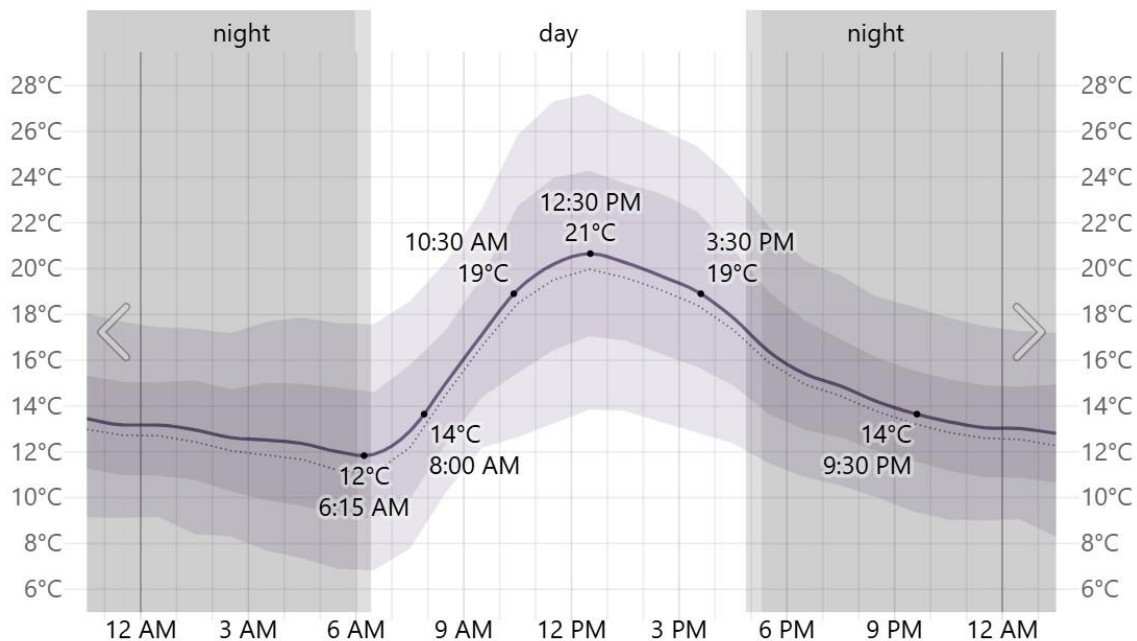
The greater Los Angeles area has a Mediterranean Climate, with winter rainfall and very warm dry summers. Humidity every day is less than 10%. The Palmdale – Santa Clarita latitude is 34.4 degrees north, and the sun angle at noon on November 12 is 38 degrees. There is a 70% likelihood of clear or partly cloudy conditions. The sunshine and humidity make it important for competitors to hydrate well.



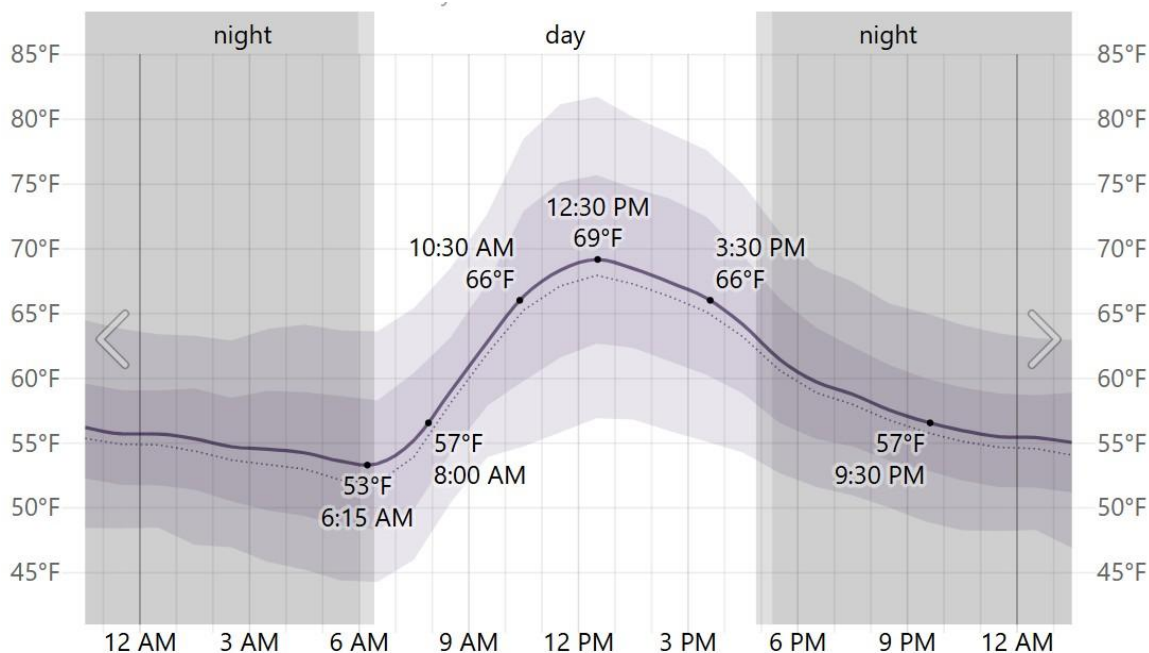
The percentage of time spent in each cloud cover band, categorized by the percentage of the sky covered by clouds. Civil twilight and night are indicated by shaded overlays.

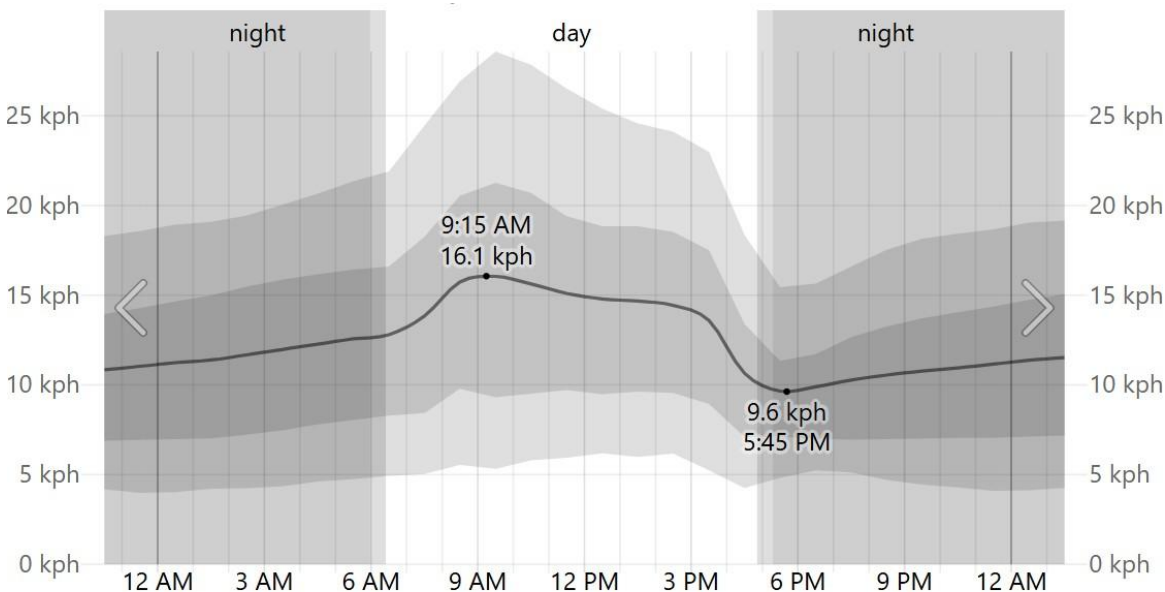

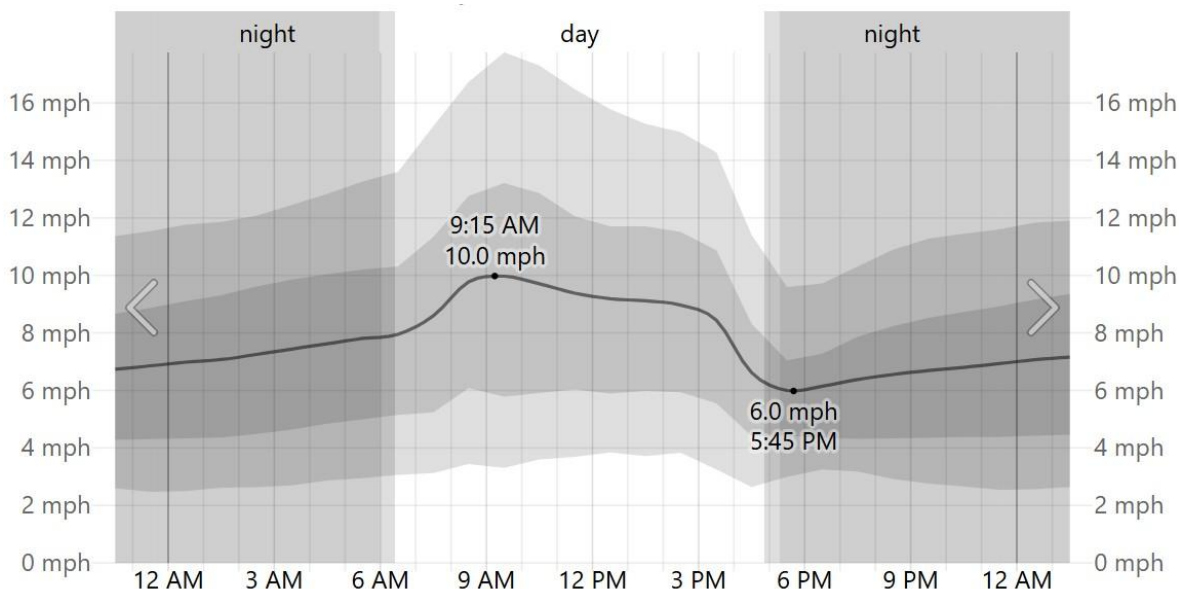
